
The Ash Wednesday service will be at 10.00am on 5 March.

Vale Bishop Keith Rayner

It is with sadness and immense gratitude to God that I notify you of the death of Bishop Keith Rayner, who died peacefully on Sunday 12th January, 2025.

Born in November, 1929, Keith was ordained in the Diocese of Brisbane in 1953, and served curacies at Auchenflower and Dalby. Incumbencies followed at the

Brisbane parishes of Sunnybank and Wynnum, during which time he also completed his doctoral thesis.

Keith was elected Bishop of Wangaratta in 1969, and was then Archbishop of Adelaide from 1975 until 1990. His time in Adelaide included overseeing significant liturgical changes across the Diocese, and social commentary on many controversial issues of the day, including the remarriage of divorced persons, homosexuality, euthanasia, indigenous issues, and uranium mining. His opinion was always respected.

He was installed as Archbishop of Melbourne in November, 1990, where he ministered until his retirement in 1999, on his 70th birthday. Bishop Keith was Primate from 1991 until his retirement, having been the Acting Primate from 1989. He was a key figure, both as Primate and as Archbishop of Melbourne, in the eventual ordination of the first women to the priesthood in Australia, leading the important National Bishops' Meeting in 1991, and chairing General Synod and the Melbourne Synod of 1992 which passed the necessary Canon to allow dioceses to ordain women to the priesthood.

Keith chaired the newly-formed Inter-Anglican Theological and Doctrinal Commission, established by the Anglican Consultative Council in 1980. He was an important contributor in the planning of the 1988 Lambeth Conference. He was also, after his retirement, a member of the committee which in 2000-2001 conducted a review of the See of Canterbury. His counsel was sought and valued at the highest levels, by a succession of Archbishops of Canterbury and other leaders within the global church.

A person of deep prayer and faith, Bishop Keith was an important influence on many people, both Lay and Ordained, during his life. I give thanks to God for his life and faithful ministry. +Geoff Smith



Brief notes from the parish meeting re possible site development.

The tenants from the community garden at St Bede's were invited to the parish meeting on 19 January, 2025.

People were invited to contribute to the two questions:

- 1. How can we enlarge the mission of the Church at St Bede's?
- 2. How can we produce more income from the property we have?
- A. A spokesperson for the tenant gardeners made the following points:
- The garden is part of the outreach of the church.
- It contributes to urban biodiversity
- The garden is well-known among the gardeners' friends
- Is there some way a garden can be incorporated in any plan developed by the church?



• The garden could possibly offer programs to families and children, do training programs or grow flowers!

B. In relation to enlarging the mission of the Church and growing the Church, the following points were put forward:

- \diamond How can we reach out to children?
- We need to change too to meet current family needs e.g conflict with Sunday sport and arranging services to be complementary.

- We need to find out what other parishes are doing to increase congregations.
- We need to do greater advertising and word of mouth recommendation.
- ♦ C. Building:
- Wayne warned of the cost of the building, the time to build (at least 18 months), the struggle to get a structure built in present economic situation, the high cost of maintenance.
- Greg spoke about the examples of integration of old and new buildings.
- Ros spoke about making the most of the assets we have without spending more money. She endorsed the gardeners' ideas about involvement of children.
- Are there other developments in the diocese.?
- D. The budget
- Colin spoke about our budget, the age of the congregation, the size of the congregation, the costs associated with the carpark and garden area, and the need for more money to guarantee the survival of the church.

These opinions and the opinions and ideas expressed in the November meeting will be taken into consideration as the Parish Council subcommittee considers the next step in the process.

What Does Faith Mean?

Alpha Course @ St. Bede's and St. Paul's

St. Bede's is joining forces with St. Paul's, Port Adelaide, to run the Alpha course, a discussion-group series created to outline the core principles of the Christian faith.

Alpha comprises a series of interactive sessions that freely explore the basics of the Christian faith, including topics such as: How Can I Be Filled with The Holy Spirit? How does God Guide us? How do I Resist



Evil? Why and How Should I Read the Bible? Why and How Do I Pray? How can I have Faith? Who is Jesus? Is There More to Life than This?

Last year, approximately 39,500 churches and organisations ran the course, with almost 1.9 million participants, according to Alpha.

Although originating from the evangelical Anglican tradition, Alpha is now used in various denominations around the world. Its supporters include many Catholic cardinals, Anglican archbishops and bishops (including Archbishop Smith) and leading figures of all denominations.

Former Archbishop of Canterbury, George Carey described the courses as "superb." Rowan Williams was an enthusiastic supporter when he was Bishop of Monmouth and Archbishop of Wales, and he continued his support as Archbishop of Canterbury, opening an Alpha conference and accepting an invitation to speak at an Alpha supper in London in 2004. He has described it as "a very special tool" and "a unique mixture of Christian content and Christian style".

Father Raniero Cantalamessa, a monk of the Order of Friars Minor Capuchin and Preacher to the Papal Household for Pope Benedict XVI wrote a document praising Alpha in June 2005. For St. Bede's, the course provides an opportunity re-vitalize your faith by going back to the basics – for newcomers, it's the chance to learn the fundamentals of Christianity. The series begins at St. Paul's with a BYO meal at 6pm on February 17 and will then alternate with St. Bede's over a 10-week period. The online presentation (everything is done using the audio-visual link through the Alpha website) starts at 7pm and runs for about an hour.

Hate Speech from a Christian Perspective

Hate speech, characterized by expressions of hostility, discrimination, or violence towards individuals or groups based on race, religion, gender, or other differences, is a growing concern in today's society.

It has become a problem in our schools, especially as children have access to mobile phones and their various platforms of communication. Hate speech has become a form of bullying often leading to social isolation, mental health problems and even suicide.

It has become a problem in politics with several recent cases where individual politicians and even their families, have been attacked on social media. Fortunately we have enough politicians with dignity who have loudly condemned such behaviour. As we approach elections this year, no doubt we will see more of this behaviour where bullies try to demean the politician rather than attack the policies or the philosophical stance with which they disagree. I don't suggest gagging free speech, but please, oppose policies not people. Admittedly, there are people in the public eye we do not like. We need to find ways to say why we do not like their actions or policies without belittling their humanity.

Nationally, a reaction to the Middle East situation has been to single out individuals and groups of people as the targets of hate speech. Although several politicians have deplored antisemitism or islamophobia as being "un-Australian", very little has been done officially to stamp out the problems. Unfortunately, waves of



immigrants have had to suffer slurs until gradually they have become accepted as part of the community. Terms like "poms", "wogs", chinks", and "towelheads" should never have been part of our vocabulary.

From a Christian perspective, the issue of hate speech is deeply rooted in the teachings of love, compassion, and respect for all individuals, regardless of their background.

Christian doctrine emphasizes the importance of loving one's neighbour, as reflected in the commandment given by Jesus Christ: "Love your neighbour as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). This teaching calls us to treat others with dignity and respect, which inherently rejects the use of hate speech. See also Luke 6.27-42 on loving enemies and judging others

The Bible also warns against the power of the tongue, which can

either bring life or destruction. James 3:5-6 highlights how "the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts... It corrupts the whole body." Words have the potential to harm others deeply, especially when they are used to spread hatred.

The phrase "Judge not, lest ye also be judged" carries a powerful message about humility and compassion. It reminds us that judgment

Christians are called to speak words that build up, not tear down, and to be agents of peace and reconciliation.

of others is not for us to make, as we all have our own flaws and shortcomings. It encourages us to practise empathy and understanding rather than condemnation, recognizing that the same standards we apply to others may be turned back on us. Ultimately, it teaches the value of treating others with kindness, knowing that we too are imperfect and in need of grace. Demeaning others actually demeans the one expressing it.

Furthermore, Christianity upholds the dignity of every person as created in the image of God (Genesis 1:27). This belief means that all people, regardless of their differences, deserve respect and kindness. Hate speech, which seeks to demean or dehumanize others, directly contradicts this core belief. DAT


